CRIMINAL LAW PRACTICUM (BUCKS COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE)

There are two slots available for third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor James Shellenberger.

The experiential project offered with this Practicum is with the Bucks County District Attorney's office located in Doylestown, the county seat for Bucks County. With approximately 40 attorneys, the office prosecutes about 9,000 criminal cases in a year. Attorneys work within a division, including narcotics, major crimes, special victims, financial crimes, homicide by vehicle, and appeals.

In this Practicum, students will be assigned to two district courts during their semester. They will appear before Magisterial District Judges and conduct preliminary hearings, negotiate cases (in conjunction with a supervising attorney), and interact and work with law enforcement, defense attorneys, and civilian victims and witnesses. Students will handle a variety of crimes, from misdemeanor drug and theft cases to felony assaults, robberies, and burglaries. Students receive an intensive training from trial attorneys within the office at the start of the semester and supervising attorneys are available throughout the semester to assist with case preparation and to answer any questions.

This Practicum is ideal for students with strong communication and interpersonal skills. Students must be able to be a Certified Legal Intern under Rules 321 or 322 of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. Students must also have taken Criminal Procedure. In terms of scheduling, in addition to handling a district court's docket of cases for one full day, students are required to spend one half day in the office, where they prepare their cases for their next court date and write an internal memo to the trial attorney on the cases they handled the previous week. The full day of court can be on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday, depending on the student's schedule. The half day can be any day Monday through Friday. CRIMINAL LAW PRACTICUM (MONTGOMERY COUNTY PUBLIC DEFENDER'S OFFICE)

There are multiple slots available for second- and third-year full-time students and third- and fourth-year part-time students in this Practicum supervised by Professor James Shellenberger.

The experiential learning opportunity offered with this Practicum is with the Montgomery County Public Defender's Office in Norristown, Pennsylvania. The attorneys at the Montgomery County Public Defender's Office protect the rights of indigent juvenile and adult individuals accused of violating the law. The Office is committed to being client centered and community-oriented defenders and determined to improve services to indigent clients by serving as a voice in county,

state, and national policy discussion, task forces, and decision-making committees. This practicum is designed to teach future lawyers the skills to successfully advocate for their clients in criminal trial or negotiation settings.

In this Practicum, students will develop research and writing skills and will gain extensive experience in the areas of criminal law and procedure. Under the supervision of other assistant defenders, students will learn general principles of criminal procedure from arrest to appeal with a week-long training session, and then get actual experience with client interviews (in office and in custody), investigations, research, client follow-up, negotiations with opposing counsel, status updates with the judiciary, disposition of the case, trial preparation, and trials. Students who are court certified under Pennsylvania Bar Rule 321/322 will have the unique opportunity to interact “on the record” with opposing counsel and the judiciary in conducting various hearings.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career in criminal law. Students must commit 12 to 15 hours per week. Preference will be given to students who have taken Criminal Procedure. CRIMINAL LAW PRACTICUM (DELAWARE COUNTY OFFICE OF THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY)

There are multiple slots available for a second- or third-year law students in this practicum supervised by Professor Marian Braccia.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is at the Delaware County Office of the District Attorney. Under the direction of Deputy District Attorney, students will be assigned to the Pre-Trial Unit, handling criminal misdemeanor and felony preliminary hearings at the Delaware County Magisterial District Courts and Summary Appeals in the Court of Common Pleas. Responsibilities will also include researching and writing memoranda and drafting motions for the Trial Division. Students may alternately or additionally be assigned to a large-scale data analysis and collection project. Additionally, as the Office creates diversion programs, students will help properly identify cases that can be placed into diversion. Students will play a meaningful role in helping to shape the Office moving forward.

Students will need to commit to 10 hours per week to this Practicum. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PRACTICUM (WOMEN AGAINST ABUSE)

There is one slot available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Sarah Katz.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Women Against Abuse (WAA). WAA is a nonprofit agency that provides comprehensive services for victims of domestic violence in Philadelphia. WAA provides services that include emergency safe haven, transitional housing, legal services, behavioral healthcare, hotline counseling, community education, and advocacy. With regard to legal representation, WAA engages in intake and direct advocacy. Each year approximately 12,000 petitions for protection from abuse orders are filed in Philadelphia. The majority of individuals seeking a protection from abuse order are unable to procure an attorney and must navigate complex legal processes on their own. In addition, many petitioners face escalating threats from an abuser to drop their case. Consequently, less than one third of petitioners obtain a final order of protection. Students who participate in this Practicum will be expected to participate in all aspects of intake at the legal department. Students will develop interviewing and counseling skills, engage in case analysis, and gain experience in case review. Additionally, students will be expected to complete legal research and analysis as needed.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career advocating on behalf of domestic violence survivors, or a career in family law, public interest law, or criminal prosecution. Students will need to commit 12 to 14 hours per week. ENVIRONMENTAL LAW PRACTICUM (CENTER FOR PROGRESSIVE REFORM)

There is one slot available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Amy Sinden.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum, the Toxic Floodwater Assessment and Risk Reduction Project along the Delaware River, is with Center for Progressive Reform. The Center for Progressive Reform harnesses the power of law and public policy to create a responsive government, a healthy environment, and a just society. See www.progressivereform.org for more information about the organization and its activities.

Objective:

Rising seas, destructive storm surges, more frequent and heavier rainfall and flooding— the impacts of climate change are present and projected to amplify in the Delaware River Basin over the next several decades. With many industrial and chemical storage facilities along the banks of the Delaware River and its tributaries, the region is increasingly vulnerable to catastrophic chemical and hazardous waste releases, threatening the health, safety, and security of local communities, many of which are already marginalized.

While flooding is common in the Delaware River Basin, many of the region’s residents, especially low-wealth and Black and Brown families, are especially vulnerable to the effects of climate change. And as extreme weather events become more frequent and severe in the coming years, this region faces an elevated risk of catastrophic hazardous chemical spills driven by flooding and other climate impacts.

To advance climate and environmental justice in these communities and strengthen public health

protections, the Center for Progressive Reform will coordinate with an interdisciplinary team of legal and policy practitioners and scholars, environmental scientists, communications specialists, grassroots advocates, and technical experts to conduct groundbreaking scientific and policy research into the risks toxic chemical spills pose to regional communities; develop and implement a communications strategy to amplify findings; and undertake advocacy around the issue.

Duties and Responsibilities:

- (1) identify the industrial facilities in the Delaware River Basin at greatest risk of flooding and chemical disaster through the first-of-its kind geospatial map;
- (2) analyze the regulatory and operational gaps that contribute to these risks of major releases;
- (3) identify and engage the communities most vulnerable to harm in collaborative research, communications, and advocacy;
- (4) develop and promote dynamic and sustained multimedia public communications; and
- (5) collaboratively develop and advocate for strategies to prevent catastrophic spills.

To elevate our findings and recommendations, the intern will aid policy analyst in background research for a public report, containing at least 8-10 maps demonstrating various industrial risks to vulnerable communities in the lower Delaware River Basin and identifying policy gaps and recommendations for Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career in environmental law, policy, and public interest. PUBLIC INTEREST PRACTICUM (PHILADELPHIA LEGAL ASSISTANCE – CONSUMER HOUSING UNIT)

There are up to 3 slots available for second-, third- or fourth-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Susan DeJarnatt.

Philadelphia Legal Assistance (PLA) is a non-profit legal services agency in Philadelphia. Funded by the Legal Services Corporation, PLA provides free legal assistance to low-income Philadelphians on a variety of legal topics, including family law, tax assistance, and homeownership.

The priorities of the Consumer Housing Unit include representing low-income homeowners facing the imminent threat of loss of homeownership as a result of mortgage and real estate tax foreclosure and/or mortgage servicing problems. As part of this work, the Consumer Housing Unit provides additional assistance to homeowners with tangled titles; meaning, Philadelphians who own part or all of a property, but do not have their name on the deed. Common scenarios include inherited homes that are subject to family disputes and properties that were fraudulently transferred.

Students in this practicum will focus on resolving tangled titles for clients, and will have the opportunity to assist Consumer Housing Unit attorneys with some or all of the following:

- Searching public records databases (using Lexis access), NewsBank's obituaries, SS

- Death Index, etc. for record owners and heirs
- Preparing FOIA requests for forwarding address information from USPS
- Searching Philadelphia Courts Civil Docket Access for property liens and active cases
- Drafting complaints
- Drafting deeds

This Practicum is ideal for students with an interest in housing justice and public interest law. Students will need to commit to a minimum of 6.5 to 10 hours per week to this Practicum depending on the number of credits they prefer. CRIMINAL JUSTICE POLICY PRACTICUM (PUBLIC DEFENDERS ASSOCIATION OF PENNSYLVANIA)

There is one slot available for second-, third-, or fourth-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Jules Epstein.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Public Defender Association of Pennsylvania (PDAP), a non-profit corporation whose membership is comprised of the 600 or so public defenders employed full or part time in Pennsylvania’s 67 county public defender offices of this Commonwealth. Incorporated in 1971, PDAP is a statewide community of public defenders dedicated to securing a fair justice system and ensuring high quality legal representation for people facing loss of life, freedom or family. Its mission is to provide tools, strategies, mutual support, training and information to Public Defender Offices in Pennsylvania; to be the voice of public defense in Pennsylvania; and to promote best practices in the leadership, management, and administration of justice in Pennsylvania.

In this Practicum, students will work to support and build community for Pennsylvania’s Public Defenders by engaging in some or all of the following:

- Tracking and summarizing Pennsylvania legislation related to the crimes code and criminal justice
- Participating and supporting the effort to secure funding from the state for Pennsylvania’s Public Defenders, including research on indigent defense funding and the cost of wrongful convictions, preparing for and attending meetings with state legislators, and assisting with communications outreach to state legislators
- Expanding and facilitating communications campaigns to Public Defenders across Pennsylvania, including website review, working with committees and working groups of Public Defenders from across the state, and preparing communications for Public Defenders across Pennsylvania

- Supporting training initiatives for Public Defenders, including updating training materials and logistical help with training conferences

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career as a public defender or criminal justice law and policy. CRIMINAL JUSTICE PRACTICUM (PHILADELPHIA LAWYERS FOR SOCIAL EQUITY)

There are two slots available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Associate Dean Kristen Murray.

Philadelphia Lawyers for Social Equity (PLSE) offers free legal representation to low-income clients who are trying to clear their criminal records so they can qualify for better jobs, housing, credit, and other benefits. (By way of background, if someone is arrested in Pennsylvania and charged with a crime, even they never had to attend court or were later found not guilty after a trial, or anything in between, they still have a criminal record. Unless it is sealed or a judge orders it to be erased or expunged, that criminal record is permanently available on the internet to the public. The only way to get a conviction off your record, even if it was committed decades ago, is to get a pardon from the Governor of Pennsylvania.) Through its Criminal Record Expungement Project, PLSE files petitions for expungement that, after a hearing, could result in a judicial order that commands the City and State police and other agencies to remove the information of that person’s criminal history from their record. PLSE files over 2,400 expungement petitions per year. Additionally, PLSE has a growing community education and outreach program.

In this Practicum, students will have a range of duties, with tasks varying week to week. Students will conduct intakes at community clinics and on the phone, draft and review expungement petitions, inform clients about updates in their case, and accompany the attorney to court. Students who are certified legal interns under Rules 321 or 322 of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court may have the opportunity to argue motions for expungement in court. Students will conduct research and write legal memoranda. There will be opportunities for public speaking and community presentations, as well as attending and tabling at community events. Students will have an opportunity to have a hand in their rapidly evolving pardon project and help develop the curriculum. PLSE is a rapidly growing small organization, and as such, there are constantly evolving projects that require creativity, flexibility, and initiative.

This Practicum is ideal for students with an interest in criminal justice, public policy, and public interest. Students must commit at least 10 hours a week to this Practicum. The experiential component of this Practicum will be in-person. CRIMINAL LAW PRACTICUM (PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE LAW DIVISION)

There are multiple slots for second-, third-, and fourth-year law students in this practicum supervised by Professor Shellenberger.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office, the largest Prosecutor's office in Pennsylvania, and one of the largest in the nation. The District Attorney's Office is responsible for prosecution of over 50,000 criminal cases yearly. In this Practicum, students will have the opportunity to work in the Appeals Unit, the PCRA Unit, or the Federal Litigation Unit. Students in the Appeals Unit will research, write, and edit post-conviction appellate briefs to be filed in the Pennsylvania Superior Court. Students in the PCRA Unit will research, write, and edit responses to Post-Conviction Relief Act petitions and assist ADAs with preparing for evidentiary hearings. Students in the Federal Litigation Unit will assist ADAs in responding to federal habeas petitions, including conducting relevant legal research and drafting and editing federal filings.

Students will need to commit to 10 hours a week for this three-credit practicum. EMERGING TECHNOLOGIES AND INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS ADVOCACY PRACTICUM (in collaboration with iLIT, Temple's Institute on Law, Innovation & Technology)

There are up to four slots available for Spring 2023 in this practicum supervised by iLIT Executive Director Laura Bingham and Professor Salil Mehra. This practicum will be 10 hours per week for 3 credit hours. It is open to 2Ls, 3Ls, and 4L Evening Division students.

The experiential learning project offered with this practicum is with the Open Society Foundation's Justice Initiative and Global Digital Identification Initiative. Both units are strategic partners within of one of the world's largest philanthropic networks which also engages in direct policy advocacy, litigation, and strategic communications in line with its mission and goals.

This practicum will support current and developing interventions related to governance of emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence, biometric identification, and migration surveillance. Students will gain exposure to pressing national and global policy debates through direct engagement in support of ongoing transnational litigation, industry research, and broader normative processes concerning the governance and regulation of emerging technologies.

In light of the multidimensional nature of the work undertaken in the practicum, we are seeking enrollment from students with a range of experience and diverse academic and professional interests. The practicum offers the opportunity to learn about the design, implementation and emerging accountability frameworks governing new technologies, international human rights

litigation in practice, and the field of philanthropy.

EMPLOYMENT LAW PRACTICUM (EMPLOYMENT ADVOCACY PROJECT)

There are up to 3 slots available for second- and third-year full-time students in this Practicum.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Employment Advocacy Project, a project of Philadelphia Legal Assistance. EAP provides direct representation to clients who have had their Unemployment Compensation Benefits denied or contested.

In this Practicum, students will interview clients, build legal strategies, meet with clients in person to discuss the strategy and prep the client for a trial-like hearing. Advocates will then go to Unemployment Compensation Hearings and represent their clients before hearing referees, which includes direct examination, cross examination, and the use of documentary evidence. Students will also write appeal briefs to the Unemployment Compensation Board of Review. EAP expects students to work collaboratively to develop best practices and support other advocates. Philadelphia Legal Assistance has a substantial state appellate case load and students may have the opportunity to draft court briefs.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, employment law, and who are eager to work with and represent clients. Students must commit to 6.5 hours per week for a 2-credit practicum. This includes attendance at 2 to 3 mandatory training sessions, participation in “case rounds” in which you will discuss your cases, teach, and learn from the experience of other advocates, and availability for at least two blocks of time (three hours each) Monday through Friday between 8:00 am to 4:00 pm to take clients. All other times may be fit around your schedule and can include remote work. ENTREPRENEURIAL PRACTICUM (ROBIN HOOD VENTURES)

There is one slot for a second-, third-, or fourth-year law student in this practicum supervised by Professor Jonathan Lipson.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Robin Hood Ventures, one of Philadelphia's largest angel investing groups.

In this Practicum, students will assist the group with: performing pre-investment due diligence on applicant companies in support of, and at the guidance of, RHV's investor-led due diligence teams; producing post-deal closing binders, investment summaries/updates, and tracking material terms of existing deals such as warrant expiration dates, etc.; and attending monthly investor meetings.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are interested in the entrepreneurial space, the capital markets space, and/or general transactional work.

Casey and now codified by Act 29 of 2017, the Pennsylvania Office of State Inspector General's (OSIG) Southeast Regional Office's (801 Market Street, Philadelphia) mission is to "deter, detect, prevent, and eradicate fraud, waste, misconduct and abuse in the program, operations and contracting of executive agencies." The OSIG has two investigative bureaus: the Bureau of Fraud Prevention and Prosecution (BFPP) and the Bureau of Special Investigations (BSI). BFPP assists the Department of Human Services (DHS) with investigation, prosecution and collection activities for the public benefit programs it administers while BSI investigates allegations of fraud, abuse and misconduct in state agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction. In this Practicum, the student will work closely with attorneys on every aspect of an investigation. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Consulting with supervising attorney, and in collaboration with BSI investigators and

JUDICIAL INTERNSHIP PRACTICUM (DELAWARE COURT OF CHANCERY)

There is one slot available for second- and third-year full-time law students and third- and fourth-year part time law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Jonathan Lipson.

The experiential component of this Practicum is with the Delaware Court of Chancery. The Delaware Court of Chancery is the preeminent forum for resolving disputes involving the internal affairs of Delaware corporations and other business entities responsible for a significant amount of the world’s commerce. The Court of Chancery is a non-jury trial court that exclusively handles civil cases. Founded in 1792, the court traces its roots to feudal England and has jurisdiction to hear and determine all matters and causes in equity. In today's practice, litigation in the Court of Chancery focuses on complex corporate and commercial disputes. The court’s unique docket stems from Delaware’s role as the legal home to more than 1.3 million entities, accounting for approximately two-thirds of all Fortune 500 companies and one-half of all public corporations in the United States. The Court of Chancery also handles guardianships, trust and estate matters, and land disputes. The members of the court consist of the Chancellor, six Vice Chancellors and two Masters.

In this placement, students will work closely with a Judicial Officer’s law clerk to assist with legal research, assist in the preparation of judicial opinions and memoranda, read and review motions and briefs before the court, attend arguments, hearings and trials, and assist the judge in myriad other ways. Because the Court of Chancery handles a high volume of cases at an unusually rapid pace, students can see many cases go through the entire lifecycle from complaint to final resolution. In addition, because the court issues numerous detailed written decisions, including post-trial decisions, students have the opportunity to make substantial contributions to the legal opinions of the court.

This practicum is ideal for students seeking a judicial clerkship, interested in a career in corporate law, or students who want to gain valuable research and writing experience. CHILD ADVOCACY UNIT PRACTICUM (DEFENDER ASSOCIATION OF PHILADELPHIA)

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Defender Association of Philadelphia. The Defender Association of Philadelphia is a nonprofit law firm created in 1934 by a group of lawyers dedicated to the belief that everyone, regardless of income, deserves the highest quality legal representation. Firmly rooted in Philadelphia for over 80 years, the Defender Association stands as the city's vanguard for indigent defense.

The Child Advocacy Unit (CAU) is a specialty unit within the Defender Association that ensures quality representation inside and outside of the courtroom for children involved in dependency and adoption cases. The CAU was created in 1974 and contracts with the City of Philadelphia to represent children, ranging from birth to twenty-one years old, who have open dependent petitions in Family Court; are victims of neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, or abandonment; are truant or incorrigible; are facing mental health challenges; need additional supports as they transition into adult living or desire to re-enter the dependent system through a Resumption of Jurisdiction Motion. The CAU utilizes a multi-disciplinary approach to child advocacy by teaming attorneys and social workers to represent our young clients. They represent most of the dependent children in Philadelphia, and presently have (16) staff attorneys and (34) social workers/social service advocates.

In this Practicum, students are expected to participate in all aspects of representing our clients, who range in age from birth to 21 years of age. The practicum curriculum will focus on how to collaboratively work a case using a strengths-based lens of looking at the family and how to navigate the system for the maximum benefit to the client; our multi-disciplinary team approach (social worker/attorney); courtroom experience (permanency and dispositional hearings); developing interviewing, counseling and investigatory skills; research into community programs and services for our clients and their families; collaboration with outside agencies to meet the needs and welfare of our clients; ethical considerations inherent in our dual role of counsel and guardian ad litem; developing the appropriate tools to successfully communicate with clients and conduct legal research, analysis and writing as needed.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career advocating on behalf of children in the dependency arena and the child welfare system, or a career in public interest law. Students will need to commit to a minimum of 6.5 to 10 hours per week to this Practicum depending on the number of credits they prefer. This Practicum with the Civil Division of the United States Attorney's Office in Philadelphia supplements traditional classroom study by offering students the opportunity to hone their legal skills by working with Assistant United States Attorneys (AUSAs) toward the resolution of cases in litigation or at the pre-complaint stage. Students will have the opportunity to deepen their substantive knowledge, sharpen essential lawyering skills, and appreciate professional values of the legal profession. Under the supervision of one or more AUSAs in the civil division of the United States Attorney's Office in Philadelphia, students will engage in and observe all phases of work of the civil side of the United States Attorney's Office—to include both affirmative and defensive

litigation—in subject areas including, but not limited to: torts, employment discrimination, civil rights, disability rights, environmental law, and healthcare fraud. Students will assist civil division AUSAs with a variety of casework, the nature of which depends upon the needs of each case. Assignments may include legal research, analysis, and writing; attending meetings and court hearings; assisting with witness interviews and taking/defending depositions; drafting and responding to discovery; and participating in all aspects of arbitrations and trials (including witness examination). Externs will have regular opportunities for feedback.

Office of the Solicitor, Philadelphia Regional Office. The Philadelphia Regional Solicitor's Office is responsible for most civil trial litigation and legal support for the U.S. DOL in several states including Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Delaware, and the District of Columbia. The Office is primarily involved in the enforcement of a number of federal laws that ensure that our region's workers are employed in safe and healthy workplaces, are paid at least the federal minimum and overtime wage rates, and are treated without regard to race, color, sex, national origin, religion, or status as a whistleblower, a person with disability or a veteran.

In this Practicum, students will be engaged in an immersive litigation experience and be permitted a “deep dive” into complex and compelling labor cases involving FLSA, OSHA, MSHA, ERISA, and whistleblower cases, among others. Students will perform legal research, draft motions, help propound and respond to discovery, help prepare for taking and defending depositions, and prepare for and participate in settlement conferences, various in-court motions practice and proceedings, pre-trial conferences, and trial.

This Practicum is ideal for second- or third-year law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, litigation and labor law. Students must commit to 10 hours per week. This placement is expected to be remote at this point. “NAME, IMAGE AND LIKENESS” PRACTICUM

Since the landmark U.S. Supreme Court decision last year in the *Alston* case and with a change in NCAA policies and the enactment of new state laws, college athletes who were previously prohibited from accepting money for sponsorship or endorsement deals (or risk losing their amateur status and eligibility to compete in college sports) can now receive money for promoting products and services. This area is heavily regulated by various state laws and university policies, and navigating these waters requires research and analysis of permissible and prohibited conduct under both.

The student who participates in this Practicum will be expected to assist Mr. Kelso with all phases of his representation of his existing clients and with his negotiations with new, prospective clients. Students will utilize the skills of factual investigation, legal research and writing, drafting and

analysis as needed.

Because his office is in Florida, students will interact with Mr. Kelso mainly via Zoom, email, telephone and by other electronic means, although there may be opportunities to meet in person with clients and prospective clients in the Northeast, where Mr. Kelso has clients at major universities.

The Council is continuing this tradition of tackling big challenges through programs to address the public health and environmental threats caused by shale gas extraction and distribution, climate change, developments in our energy markets and infrastructure, and major stationary sources of air pollution.

The Council maintains an active litigation docket addressing a broad range of environmental health issues in Pennsylvania and beyond. The Council regularly brings cases in both state and federal courts and before agency tribunals, such as Pennsylvania's Environmental Hearing Board and Public Utility Commission. We litigate a wide variety of issues within the realm of air quality regulation, water law, and energy law. The Council also engages in a significant amount of policy work, leading the charge on a variety of issues in Pennsylvania such as Pennsylvania's implementation of carbon cap and trade and regulation of methane emissions.

Students must complete a minimum of 10 hours each week of the semester of experiential work, classroom learning, or out of class assignments. Preference will be given to students who have taken, or will

take concurrently, Environmental Law and Natural Resources. HEALTH, REPRODUCTIVE, AND HUMAN RIGHTS PRACTICUM (INTERNATIONAL RESCUE COMMITTEE)

There are two slots available for second-, third-, and fourth-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professors Patty Skuster and Scott Burris.

The experiential learning projects offered with this Practicum is with the International Rescue Committee (IRC). IRC provides opportunities for refugees, asylees, victims of human trafficking, survivors of torture, and other immigrants to thrive in America. Each year, thousands of people, forced to flee violence and persecution, are welcomed by the people of the United States into the safety and freedom of America. These individuals have survived against incredible odds. The IRC works with government bodies, civil society actors, and local volunteers to help them translate their past experiences into assets that are valuable to their new communities.

Following the US Supreme Court Ruling in *Dobbs v. Jacking*, which overturned the constitutional right to abortion, states regulation of abortion is widely varied. About half of U.S. states have already restricted access to abortion care with more expected to follow. Depending on the state, both the person seeking an abortion and individuals assisting in accessing abortion care may be legally vulnerable. Other states, however, are moving to protect abortion access and to prepare for an increase in individuals traveling to their state for services.

This ruling has significant implications for the IRC’s U.S. clients. IRC anticipates that abortion restrictions will make accessing abortion care and other sexual and reproductive healthcare services more difficult, leading to negative health, psychological, and socioeconomic outcomes. Evidence clearly shows that legally restricting and criminalizing abortion does not reduce the number of abortions, and instead increases the likelihood of unsafe abortions with potentially deadly consequences. Additionally, limiting the right to abortion care is connected to other human rights the IRC is committed to such as bodily autonomy, gender equality, and racial justice. The IRC is committed to continuing to support access to safe abortion care, advancing reproductive rights and justice in our programs, and providing clients with evidence-based services.

Students in this practicum will update a legal guide for the provision of abortion care in IRC operational and soon-to-be operational states, which includes scenarios noting proposed abortion access bills and what may happen in the next 12 months. The students will provide up-to-date state-based information to IRC about the law as it pertains to abortion providers and individuals who may provide information and other assistance to IRC clients who need abortion. The students will build upon work completed by a consultant which ends in December 2022. The students will complete the project using policy surveillance data from the Center for Public Health Law research, with verification through other sources such as the Guttmacher Institute, Center for Reproductive Rights

and others.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, reproductive rights and justice, the rights of refugees and migrants, providing legal assistance to organizations providing health and social services, or legal research and public interest advocacy. IMMIGRATION LAW PRACTICUM (NATIONALITIES SERVICE CENTER and HIAS)

There are up to 2 slots at NSC and 3 slots at HIAS available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Associate Dean Jaya Ramji-Nogales.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Nationalities Service Center (NSC) and HIAS. At either NSC or HIAS, students will develop their advocacy skills and deepen their understanding of asylum, refugee, and international human rights law. They will represent asylum applicants, asylees, and refugees who have been victims of torture, gender violence, unlawful arrests, and other forms of persecution on account of their race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership in a particular group. Students will perform a variety of legal tasks ranging from interviewing clients, drafting documents and petitions, researching country conditions, and preparing motions and legal briefs for cases before the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS), Immigration Court, the Board of Immigration Appeals, and the Third Circuit Court of Appeals.

Students must commit 10 to 12 hours per week to this Practicum. Students with Spanish language skills will be given preference at HIAS, but this is not a requirement. Students with Spanish, Farsi, Dari, or Pashto language skills will be given preference at NSC, but this is not a requirement. In this Practicum, students prepare research memos, draft briefs, assist in meetings and negotiations with taxpayers, and sometimes, appear before the Board of Revision of Taxes.

Students must commit 12 to 15 hours per week. Applicants must have completed and received a grade in Taxation in order to be eligible for this Practicum.
