Temple Law School is pleased to announce the following Spring 2025 School Designed Practicum courses. The individual description for each practicum sets forth what materials to submit, to whom you should submit the materials, and the application deadline. Placements for a given practicum will not be made until after the application deadline for that practicum.

A Practicum combines an experiential learning project with supervision and evaluation by a member of the full-time faculty. Some Practicum courses are designed individually by the student in consultation with a faculty member; others are recurring projects that faculty members sponsor, like those listed below.

Below is a table of contents grouping our School Designed Practicums in three broad categories: Confirmed, Pending Confirmation, and No Longer Accepting Applications. The practicum opportunities confirmed for next semester are further organized by application deadline date.

We encourage you to apply for any practicum opportunities that are confirmed or pending confirmation for Spring 2025. **The information contained in Pending Confirmation section, including whether the practicum will ultimately be offered in Spring 2025, is subject to change. In the event we confirm that any of our practicums pending confirmation will not run in the spring, we will notify applicants and update this catalogue accordingly.**

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I. Confirmed

A. Application Deadline: October 21, 2024

CIVIL LITIGATION PRACTICUM (UNITED STATES ATTORNEY’S OFFICE – CIVIL DIVISION)

There are up to three slots available for second- third- and fourth-year law students in this 3-credit Practicum.

This Practicum with the Civil Division of the United States Attorney’s Office in Philadelphia supplements traditional classroom study by offering students the opportunity to hone their legal skills by working with Assistant United States Attorneys (AUSAs) toward the resolution of cases in litigation or at the pre-complaint stage. Students will have the opportunity to deepen their substantive knowledge, sharpen essential lawyering skills, and appreciate professional values of the legal profession. Under the supervision of one or more AUSAs in the civil division of the United States Attorney’s Office in Philadelphia, students will engage in and observe all phases of work of the civil side of the United States Attorney's Office—to include both affirmative and defensive litigation—in subject areas including, but not limited to: torts, employment discrimination, civil rights, disability rights, environmental law, and healthcare fraud. Students will assist civil division AUSAs with a variety of casework, the nature of which depends upon the needs of each case. Assignments may include legal research, analysis, and writing; attending meetings and court hearings; assisting with witness interviews and taking/defending depositions; drafting and responding to discovery; and participating in all aspects of arbitrations and trials (including witness examination). Externs will have regular opportunities for feedback.

Students will need to commit to a minimum of 10 hours per week to this Practicum. To participate

in this Practicum, students must also be eligible for court certification. A security clearance must be obtained prior to the start of the semester's work, which requires selected students to provide their Social Security Card, Passport, and/or Birth Certificate. MEDICAL RESEARCH AND THE LAW PRACTICUM (THE WISTAR INSTITUTE)

There are up to two slots available for second- and third-year students in this Practicum.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Wistar Institute. Join a rich history of over 125 years of cutting-edge research and vaccine development in your practicum at The Wistar Institute. Wistar's Legal Department seeks motivated and creative students with an interest in health, life sciences, and/or nonprofit law.

Located in the heart of University City, Wistar is the nation's first independent institution devoted to biomedical research and training. Today, Wistar is an international leader in basic biomedical research in cancer and infectious diseases. Wistar's discoveries have led to the development of vaccines for rabies, rubella, rotavirus, Zika, and most recently, COVID-19, as well as the identification of genes associated with breast, lung, and prostate cancer, and the development of monoclonal antibodies and other significant research technologies and tools.

Founded as an anatomical teaching museum in 1892, Wistar has committed itself to the pursuit of original scientific knowledge from its very beginnings. In 1972, Wistar was designated a National Cancer Institute Cancer Center in basic research—a distinction it holds to this day. Today, Wistar employs approximately 350 researchers and staff dedicated to Wistar's mission to marshal the talents of outstanding scientists through a highly-enabled culture of biomedical collaboration and innovation, in order to solve some of the world's most challenging and important problems in the field of cancer, immunology, and infectious diseases, and produce groundbreaking advances in world health. Consistent with a pioneering legacy of leadership in not-for-profit biomedical research and a track record of life-saving contributions in immunology and cell biology, Wistar aims to pursue novel and courageous research paths to life science discovery, and to accelerate/potentiate the impact of those discoveries by shortening the path from bench to bedside.

In addition to its focus on science and innovation, one of Wistar's primary objectives is to educate students. In an average year, approximately 100 graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, and visiting scientists from around the world are trained at Wistar. Wistar also houses a high school fellowship program, a unique Biomedical Technician Training Program and a Biomedical Research Technician Apprenticeship, which is the first of its kind in the United States. In turn, Wistar-trained investigators can be found among the leaders in every field of biomedical science. Wistar scientists have assembled state-of-the-art technologies into Shared Resources which function as engines of

discovery for biomedical research initiatives at Wistar and throughout the greater research community. These resources include Bioinformatics, Biomedical Research Support, Flow Cytometry, Genomics, Imaging, Molecular Screening & Protein Expression, and Proteomics & Metabolomics.

This Practicum is an ideal opportunity for students interested in hands-on experience working in-house at a nonprofit organization in the biomedical research industry. Students will witness firsthand how lawyers can support and work to propel medical innovation forward through the power of collaboration with academic and industry partners.

Examples of tasks performed by law students include:

- Conducting legal research, analysis and writing on a broad range of topics, including regulatory and compliance requirements for the conduct of scientific research, data and privacy issues, intellectual property, corporate and nonprofit law, and labor and employment issues;
- Drafting, reviewing and revising various contracts and agreements, including confidentiality, material transfer, data use, clinical trial, government, consulting, and vendor agreements;
- Drafting and reviewing institutional policies, procedures and templates; and
- Attending meetings with internal leaders and stakeholders.

Students will need to commit to a minimum of 6.5 to 10 hours per week to this Practicum depending on the number of credits they prefer. IMMIGRATION PRACTICUM (ESPERANZA IMMIGRATION LEGAL SERVICES UNIT)

There are up to 3 slots available for second- or third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Jennifer Lee.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Esperanza Immigration Legal Services. Esperanza Immigration Legal Services (EILS) was formed in 2009 to provide low-cost, non-litigation legal services to low-income immigrants and their families, including self-petitions for victims of domestic violence, green card applications, family petitions and naturalization applications.

EILS is in the heart of a low-income Latino neighborhood in North Philadelphia. EILS offers convenient, affordable and culturally accessible services to the most underserved immigrants, with a focus on the Hispanic community. EILS also offers workshops in English and Spanish to help immigrant families thrive in the United States, on topics such as financial literacy, debunking

common immigration myths, and preparation for emergency situations. Finally, EILS conducts citizenship classes every summer to prepare eligible candidates for the citizenship exam.

In this Practicum, students can be expected to assist in drafting, researching and preparing immigration applications before the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services involving Citizenship, Adjustment of Status, Family Petitions, I90 renewals, DACA Renewals, Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) petitions, U visas, and/or T visas. Students will also develop interviewing, and public speaking skills by conducting legal screenings as well as by participating in Know Your Rights Info session, clinics and outreaches.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career advocating on behalf of immigrant populations, or a career in public interest law. Students will need to commit to a minimum of 6.5 to 10 hours per week to this Practicum depending on the number of credits they prefer. Students must be professionally bilingual in Spanish and English. ATTORNEY ETHICS PRACTICUM (OFFICE OF DISCIPLINARY COUNSEL OF THE SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA)

There is one slot available for second- or third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Barry McCarthy.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with The Office of Disciplinary Counsel of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania (ODC). In this practicum, students assist with the investigation and prosecution of complaints of violations of the Rules of Professional Conduct. The student would be responsible, under the supervision of an assigned Disciplinary Counsel, for: reviewing complaints of lawyer misconduct; performing legal research; writing legal memoranda; drafting chronologies; preparing exhibits for hearings; memorializing witness interviews; and participating in discussions regarding the handling of complaints and hearing strategy. The student would be immersed into interesting fact patterns and be exposed to a wide variety of law, including criminal, immigration, bankruptcy, personal injury, and domestic relations.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, attorney ethics and professional conduct. Applicants must have a minimum 3.0 GPA, pass a criminal background check, and sign a confidentiality agreement. COMPLIANCE PRACTICUM

There are multiple slots available for second-, third-, and fourth-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Michael Donnella.

The experiential component of this Practicum is within a company in the compliance department. Compliance officers navigate the complex laws and regulations that govern the work of companies in a broad range of industries from the pharmaceutical field to health care, to the financial sector. Compliance work can include risk analysis and the creation and implementation of controls and solutions. Compliance officers examine, evaluate, and investigate eligibility for, and compliance with, laws and regulations. Students will be expected to participate in all aspects of compliance work including the investigation, research, and analysis of eligibility and compliance. Students will be expected to identify issues, theories, strategies, and solutions. Past participating companies include Aramark, Temple University Health System, Temple University Office of Ethics and Compliance, Saint Joseph University, and Xylem.

Temple Law's Compliance Practicums are ideal for law students who are interested in learning more about how to analyze risk, evaluate eligibility and compliance, and work for some of the top companies in the region. Students will need to commit 10-15 hours per week. EMPLOYMENT LAW PRACTICUM (EMPLOYMENT ADVOCACY PROJECT)

There are up to two slots available for second- and third-year full-time students in this Practicum.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Employment Advocacy Project, a project of Philadelphia Legal Assistance. EAP provides direct representation to clients who have had their Unemployment Compensation Benefits denied or contested.

In this Practicum, students will interview clients, build legal strategies, meet with clients in person to discuss the strategy and prep the client for a trial-like hearing. Advocates will then go to Unemployment Compensation Hearings and represent their clients before hearing referees, which includes direct examination, cross examination, and the use of documentary evidence. Students will also write appeal briefs to the Unemployment Compensation Board of Review. EAP expects students to work collaboratively to develop best practices and support other advocates. Philadelphia Legal Assistance has a substantial state appellate case load and students may have the opportunity to draft court briefs.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, employment law, and who are eager to work with and represent clients. Students must commit to 6.5 hours per week for a 2-credit practicum. This includes attendance at 2 to 3 mandatory training sessions, participation in "case rounds" in which you will discuss your cases, teach, and learn from

the experience of other advocates, and availability for at least two blocks of time (three hours each) Monday through Friday between 8:00 am to 4:00 pm to take clients. All other times may be fit around your schedule and can include remote work. EMPLOYMENT LAW PRACTICUM (CAREERLINK UNEMPLOYMENT NAVIGATOR)

There are up to two slots available for second- and third-year full-time students in this Practicum.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Philadelphia Legal Assistance. PLA is a grantee of the US Department of Labor's very first Navigator grant. The idea behind the program is to provide individualized assistance to underserved populations who struggle to access Unemployment Compensation (UC). Part of PLA's project under the grant is providing in-person navigator services at CareerLink North (4261 N 5th St, Philadelphia, PA 19140) on Mondays and Thursdays. PLA helps workers, many of whom speak Spanish as their first language, understand the UC system and their potential eligibility, and assist them with filing initial applications for benefits, weekly claims, and appeals. Many of these workers would never submit an application or follow up on the benefits if it wasn't for this one-on-one assistance. A lot of this work is showing claimants how to use the online computer system while educating them about the whole process. We would love to pair a law student with our staff navigators on Mondays and Thursdays. They would be supervised by an attorney. Students will have a lot one on one client assistance and achievable results!

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, employment law, and who are eager to work with clients. Students must commit to 6.5 hours per week for a 2-credit practicum and be available for at least two blocks of time (three hours each) in person Monday and/or Thursday between 9 am and 3 pm to work with clients. All other times may be fit around your schedule and can include remote work. If you are interested, please forward your resume and a cover letter/statement of interest addressed to “Employment Law Practicum Selection Committee – CareerLink Unemployment Navigator” to lawpract@temple.edu by **12:00 pm on November 15, 2024**. In your cover letter, please note any Spanish-speaking skills (which is not a criterion, but strong preference will be given to students who speak Spanish at least conversationally).

ENVIRONMENTAL LAW PRACTICUM (DELAWARE RIVERKEEPER NETWORK)

There are up to two slots available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Amy Sinden.

The experiential component of this three-credit Practicum is designed to expose students to the

broad intersection of litigation, transactional work, policy, advocacy and work with grass-roots organizations. It provides a specialized and unique course of study focused on the local region's natural heritage, practical legal skills, and special issues and pitfalls in environmental law. In conjunction with this placement, students will work closely with the Delaware Riverkeeper as well as the senior and staff attorneys of the Delaware Riverkeeper Network to provide legal support to environmental professionals and citizens to help effectively protect our environment and communities through compliance with the federal, state, and local environmental laws and regulations. Under the supervision and guidance of the senior and staff attorneys, students will be expected to act as junior staff attorneys – perform legal research; draft strategy memoranda, pleadings, briefs and other legal documents for timely filing with courts and other government agencies; and write and present comments and testimony before bodies considering proposals that will affect the environment.

Please note that the experiential hours of this practicum may be completed remotely or in-person (to be determined between you and the practicum). Any in-person experiential hours will be held at the Delaware Riverkeeper Network, which is located at 925 Canal Street in Bristol, Pennsylvania, directly across from the Bristol train station (SEPTA Trenton Line) and has ample parking.

This Practicum is ideal for students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career in environmental law, or students who want to gain writing experience. Students must complete a minimum of 10 hours each week of the semester of experiential work, classroom learning, or out of class assignments. Preference will be given to students who have taken, or will take concurrently, Environmental Law and Natural Resources. IMMIGRATION LAW PRACTICUM (NATIONALITIES SERVICE CENTER and HIAS)

There are up to 3 slots available at HIAS and up to 2 slots available at NSC for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Dean Jaya Ramji-Nogales.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Nationalities Service Center (NSC) and HIAS. At either NSC or HIAS, students will develop their advocacy skills and deepen their understanding of asylum, refugee, and international human rights law. They will represent asylum applicants, asylees, and refugees who have been victims of torture, gender violence, unlawful arrests, and other forms of persecution on account of their race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership in a particular group. Students will perform a variety of legal tasks ranging from interviewing clients, drafting documents and petitions, researching country conditions, and preparing motions and legal briefs for cases before the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS), Immigration Court, the Board of Immigration Appeals, and the Third Circuit Court of Appeals.

Students must commit 10 to 12 hours per week to this Practicum. Students with Spanish language

CHILD ADVOCACY UNIT PRACTICUM (DEFENDER ASSOCIATION OF PHILADELPHIA)

There are up to two slots available for third year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Sarah Katz.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Defender Association of Philadelphia. The Defender Association of Philadelphia is a nonprofit law firm created in 1934 by a group of lawyers dedicated to the belief that everyone, regardless of income, deserves the highest quality legal representation. Firmly rooted in Philadelphia for over 80 years, the Defender Association stands as the city’s vanguard for indigent defense.

The Child Advocacy Unit (CAU) is a specialty unit within the Defender Association that ensures quality representation inside and outside of the courtroom for children involved in dependency and adoption cases. The CAU was created in 1974 and contracts with the City of Philadelphia to represent children, ranging from birth to twenty-one years old, who have open dependent petitions in Family Court; are victims of neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, or abandonment; are truant or incorrigible; are facing mental health challenges; need additional supports as they transition into adult living or desire to re-enter the dependent system through a Resumption of Jurisdiction Motion. The CAU utilizes a multi-disciplinary approach to child advocacy by teaming attorneys and social workers to represent our young clients. They represent most of the dependent children in Philadelphia, and presently have (16) staff attorneys and (34) social workers/social service advocates.

In this Practicum, students are expected to participate in all aspects of representing our clients, who range in age from birth to 21 years of age. The practicum curriculum will focus on how to collaboratively work a case using a strengths-based lens of looking at the family and how to navigate the system for the maximum benefit to the client; our multi-disciplinary team approach (social worker/attorney); courtroom experience (permanency and dispositional hearings); developing interviewing, counseling and investigatory skills; research into community programs and services for our clients and their families; collaboration with outside agencies to meet the needs and welfare of our clients; ethical considerations inherent in our dual role of counsel and guardian ad litem; developing the appropriate tools to successfully communicate with clients and conduct legal research, analysis and writing as needed.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career advocating on behalf of children in the dependency arena and the child welfare system, or a

career in public interest law. Students will need to commit to a minimum of 6.5 to 10 hours per week to this Practicum depending on the number of credits they prefer. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PRACTICUM (WOMEN AGAINST ABUSE)

There is one slot available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Sarah Katz.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with Women Against Abuse (WAA). WAA is a nonprofit agency that provides comprehensive services for victims of domestic violence in Philadelphia. WAA provides services that include emergency safe haven, transitional housing, legal services, behavioral healthcare, hotline counseling, community education, and advocacy. With regard to legal representation, WAA engages in intake and direct advocacy. Each year approximately 12,000 petitions for protection from abuse orders are filed in Philadelphia. The majority of individuals seeking a protection from abuse order are unable to procure an attorney and must navigate complex legal processes on their own. In addition, many petitioners face escalating threats from an abuser to drop their case. Consequently, less than one third of petitioners obtain a final order of protection.

Students will spend the first semester focused on Protection from Abuse cases, developing client interviewing and counseling skills, engaging in case analysis, and assisting in preparing cases for litigation. Students that participate in the year-long practicum will expand their work in the second semester to additionally focus on child custody, child support, and spousal support cases, will lead their own intakes, and prepare their own case reviews. Throughout the practicum, students will shadow attorneys at court, complete legal research and analysis as needed, contribute to policy research as needed, and attend various trauma informed trainings through the Pennsylvania Coalition for Domestic Violence.

This Practicum is ideal for law students who are committed to, or interested in learning more about, a career advocating on behalf of domestic violence survivors, or a career in family law, public interest law, or criminal prosecution. Students will need to commit 12 to 14 hours per week. Preference will be given to students with an expressed interest in working with WAA for the entire academic year. CRIMINAL JUSTICE PRACTICUM (PHILADELPHIA LAWYERS FOR SOCIAL EQUITY)

There is one slot available for second- and third-year law students in this Practicum supervised by

Professor Noelia Rivera-Calderón.

Philadelphia Lawyers for Social Equity (PLSE) offers free legal representation to low-income clients who are trying to clear their criminal records so they can qualify for better jobs, housing, credit, and other benefits. (By way of background, if someone is arrested in Pennsylvania and charged with a crime, even they never had to attend court or were later found not guilty after a trial, or anything in between, they still have a criminal record. Unless it is sealed or a judge orders it to be erased or expunged, that criminal record is permanently available on the internet to the public. The only way to get a conviction off your record, even if it was committed decades ago, is to get a pardon from the Governor of Pennsylvania.) Through its Criminal Record Expungement Project, PLSE files petitions for expungement that, after a hearing, could result in a judicial order that commands the City and State police and other agencies to remove the information of that person's criminal history from their record. PLSE files over 2,400 expungement petitions per year. Additionally, PLSE has a growing community education and outreach program.

In this Practicum, students will have a range of duties, with tasks varying week to week. Students will conduct intakes at community clinics and on the phone, draft and review expungement petitions, inform clients about updates in their case, and accompany the attorney to court. Students who are certified legal interns under Rules 321 or 322 of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court may have the opportunity to argue motions for expungement in court. Students will conduct research and write legal memoranda. There will be opportunities for public speaking and community presentations, as well as attending and tabling at community events. Students will have an opportunity to have a hand in their rapidly evolving pardon project and help develop the curriculum. PLSE is a rapidly growing small organization, and as such, there are constantly evolving projects that require creativity, flexibility, and initiative.

This Practicum is ideal for students with an interest in criminal justice, public policy, and public interest. Students must commit at least 10 hours a week to this Practicum. The experiential component of this Practicum will be in-person. EDUCATION LAW PRACTICUM (EDUCATION LAW CENTER) – Apply by November 15, 2024

There are up to two slots available for second- and third-year students in this Practicum supervised by Professor Len Rieser and Associate Dean Kristen Murray.

The Education Law Center (ELC) – Pennsylvania is a public-interest law firm dedicated to ensuring access to a quality public education for all children in Pennsylvania. ELC pursues its mission through litigation and policy advocacy on behalf of the most vulnerable students—children living in poverty, children of color, children in the foster care and juvenile justice systems, children with disabilities, English Language Learners, LGBTQ students, and children experiencing homelessness.

ADMINISTRATIVE LAW PRACTICUM (PHILADELPHIA BOARD OF ETHICS)

There are two slots available for second-, third-, and fourth-year law students in this Practicum.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum is with the Philadelphia Board of Ethics. The Philadelphia Board of Ethics was created in May 2006 by amendments to the City’s Home Rule Charter. The Board interprets, administers, and enforces the ethics provisions in the Charter and City Code. These include the City’s rules governing conflicts of interest, representation in City transactions, post-employment restrictions, gifts and gratuities, interests in City contracts, political activity, financial disclosure, lobbying, and campaign finance. Via its Enforcement Staff, the Board investigates potential violations of the laws within its jurisdiction and enforces those laws through administrative adjudication or court proceedings. The Board issues formal advisory opinions and promulgates regulations interpreting City ethics laws. The Board’s General Counsel Staff also provides informal advice, develops and delivers ethics training, and offers compliance assistance to the regulated community.

In this Practicum, the student will work closely with either Enforcement Staff or General Counsel Staff in furtherance of the Board’s mission. If assigned to Enforcement Staff, the student will assist staff in ongoing investigations of potential violations of the Public Integrity Laws as well as matters in active enforcement via legal analysis, research, and writing, and will review documents sent in response to subpoenas and formal requests. The student will learn investigatory techniques and methods and will be asked to think creatively to explore leads and develop theories of the case. Depending on timing, availability, and the student’s progress throughout the semester, the student may be asked to take the lead in witness interviews and other investigation events. If assigned to General Counsel Staff, the student will assist staff with their regulatory work. The student will be tasked with background research, drafting, and presentation of recommendations for new or amended ethics regulations. The student will also have the opportunity to attend regular General Counsel Staff meetings, which will provide exposure to Staff’s work on advice, training, and other projects.

The experiential learning project offered with this Practicum pairs its student with Adjunct Professor Paul Kaufman, an Assistant United States Attorney in the Health Care Fraud Unit of the

United States Attorney's Office (USAO) for the District of New Jersey. The practicum will take place at USAO-DNJ's Camden office, which is easily accessible by car or the PATCO train system (a 5-minute ride from Center City Philadelphia) and will involve working with AUSA/Professor Kaufman and the government and health care fraud prosecutors in Camden and Newark (remotely).

Students will research health care, defense contracting, grant, and COVID fraud topics (particular regulatory environments, statutes, regulations, and regulatory guidance); analyze compliance-adjacent documents such as statutes, regulations, and enforcement documents and creation of topic area summaries; perform data analytics of public data sources on given topics; and identify likely areas of fraud exploitation and/or targeting of business units that are likely to be committing fraud, waste, or abuse. Where possible, students will experience or lead witness investigative interviews, conduct substantive depositions, and will help craft or attend liability or defense presentations relating to their work.

This Practicum is ideal for students who are committed to the compliance field and have a vested interest in data analytics and data mining. Interest in health law and criminal law is preferable.

There are no prerequisite courses, but preference will be given to students who have taken compliance courses including Introduction to Compliance; Health Care Fraud: Investigation, Prosecution, and Compliance; or Drug and Medical Device Law.

There are multiple slots available for third- and fourth-year law students in this 3-credit Practicum.

This Practicum with the Criminal Division of the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania supplements traditional classroom study by offering students the opportunity to gain practical legal experience through hands-on work with Assistant United States Attorneys (AUSAs) involved in the investigation and prosecution of federal criminal cases. Students will deepen their understanding of criminal law, develop critical lawyering skills, and appreciate the ethical responsibilities of the legal profession. Under the supervision of one or more AUSAs, students will participate in and observe various phases of the federal criminal process, including investigations, pre-trial hearings, trials, and sentencing proceedings.

Students will assist AUSAs with a variety of tasks, which may include legal research and writing, drafting motions and briefs, assisting with evidence collection, interviewing witnesses, preparing exhibits for trial, and attending court proceedings. Depending on the needs of each case, students

may also be involved in drafting and reviewing plea agreements, assisting with discovery, and observing or participating in courtroom advocacy.

Students will need to commit to a minimum of 10 hours per week to this Practicum. A security clearance must be obtained prior to the start of the semester's work, which requires selected students to provide their Social Security Card, Passport, and/or Birth Certificate.
